Honors Cohort sets new record in feeding the hungry Prepares food for over five hundred people

The Honors Cohort set a new record on Saturday, November 5th for the number of homeless and hungry people for whom they helped to provide food during their monthly mission-outreach day. First, our young men worked at Christ Church Anglican where they prepared sack lunches for fifty homeless people in the Savannah area. Then they traveled to PACK, a local charity that supports needy children and prepared a record 487 bags of food to be distributed to those less fortunate. In sacrificing their Saturday mornings, getting up early, and coming to work for the benefit of others, expecting nothing in return, these young men embody the servant-leadership ethic demonstrated to us by Jesus Christ. In fact, servant-leadership is the only leadership style ever validated by Christ. We are very proud of the way our young men of the Honors Cohort are "leading the way" in the transformation of Bethesda Academy toward our being America's best school for young Christian leaders.
